Using traditional masonry skills in conjunction with modern technology and innovative engineering we are able to create the highest quality projects for our client.














PROCESSES

Working with our state-of-the-art machinery we recreated two classic Picasso paintings and frames from large format slabs. Portrait De Jacqueline au Chapeau de Paille - woman in a hat. The design team best matched the colours from X-tone 6mm and 3mm large format slabs ensuring each piece had as much movement as possible.

They then inlaid each piece into a waterjet cut sheet of Taj Mahal porcelain back drop and framed them with an ornate Liem Dark porcelain frame.

Materials used (*Porcelain*) -Taj Mahal, Alpi Verdi, Viola Rosse, Maequina Black, Brass Metal








Kerry Lemon

MICHAEL DISLEY







The Voice Of The City.

The Voice of the City sculpture stands near the site of Henry Penn's foundry (1685-1729), where bells were cast for Peterborough Cathedral and other churches. In this sculpture, the casting of molten metal into a stone mould represents the unstructured sounds being funnelled into a single note, symbolized further by the Chladni inlayed sound wave patterns. This iconic landmark designed by Broadbent Studios was created by Scribble Stone's waterjet techniques using Scoutmoor stone and brass to emulate sound wave-like patterns.














The Orchard.

The Orchard Trail artworks are designed to encourage interactive play, learning and exploration. Residents and visitors are invited to express their creativity by creating rubbings of the intricate inlaid designs.

The brief concept was developed to create a focal crown point which beautifully conceals a cast bronze butterfly which quietly sits beneath. The herringbone detail was created using a delicate sandblasting technique into the St Bee's sandstone.



Cambridge Rules.

In 1848 a group of students from Cambridge University wrote a set of 11 rules which everyone could finally agree upon. Nailed to a tree surrounding Parker's Piece, this was the first time that football as we know it had any formalised laws. It was the catalyst where, from this very specific patch of English landscape in the heart of Cambridge, the game spread to encompass every corner of the world

Working with designers Allan Ward and Neville Gabie we sandblasted the the original Cambridge rules in language's from across the globe into the granite units.















In 2018 villagers of Long Ithchington held many fundraising events to rise nearly £40,000 to build a local memorial. Large pieces of stone were engraved and bronze leaves were inlaid to represent represent the fallen soldiers of the First and Second World War.


The stones are set on a single stone base in the centre of a circular paved area with three stone seats, providing a place for moments of reflection.












Victoria Cross.

A campaign to honour Victoria Cross recipients from the first world war was announced in August 2013. As part of this, a commemorative paving stone will be laid at the birthplace of Victoria Cross recipients to honour their bravery, provie a lasting legacy of local heroes within communities and allow residents to better understand how their area fits into the First World War story.

A total of 628 Victoria Crosses were awarded during the First World War.






Grimsby, St Jame's Park.



St James' Square has long been a tranquil spot for locals to sit and enjoy. The newly transformed scheme features a fantastic central labyrinth made up from Scoutmoor Yorkstone and inlaid bronze which forms part of a vibrant space.

Grimsby-based Our Big Picture Ltd commissioned artist, Adrian Riley, to research and design the historic references, words and phrases that are etched into the paving and seating throughout the square, to reflect Grimsby's past, present and future.





Treasure.

Our team created 36 unique granite and brass paving slabs that Kerry Lemon designed and used to create a nature trail through Bracknell's town centre. In order to reflect the species' location in the wider borough, Kerry used the High Street as a dividing line, placing northern floral species above the main street and acidic-loving southern plants below














Honey.

This sketch shows honeysuckle - the Warwickshire County flower - with a Painted Lady butterfly. This interactive piece allows you to make rubbings of the artwork. Our team used a combination of porcelain sandblasting and water-jet cutting to bring Kerry's designs to life. This design was made with Corten porcelain, Stone porcelain, Brass, Sandblasted drawing, and grout lines. This was installed at George Elliott Hospital.







National Memorial Arboretum

Heroes Square is the focal point of a stunning new visitors' centre at the National Memorial Arboretum. Working with Caroline Cary, Major General Patrick Cordingley and the National Memorial Arboretum, we sandblasted each British Army Corps and Regiment, Royal Naval Fleet and Royal Air Force cap badge, crest or cypher into Scoutmoor stone slabs. This stunning installation sits central to the Millennium Chapel and the visitor's centre and was officially opened by HRH Prince William.









TOUCHING RIVERDOWN.

The Touching Riverdown project is another artist collaboration, taking the design from concept to realisation, creating the stunning sculptures using Stantonmoor Yorkstone and terracotta. The designs were sandblasted in the pillars resulting in a 3D embossed detail, a nod to the rich history of Medieval tile making in the local area combined with native flora and fauna of the park, enabling visitors to enjoy the craft of frottaging from the sculptures.


The Andrew Wiles Building

This amazing Penrose floor design at The Andrew Wiles Building at Oxford University was produced by CNC and waterjet cutting stainless steel shapes and inlaying them into granite units. The pattern is an example of a Penrose tiling, named after its discoverer Sir Roger Penrose, a celebrated professor at the university. The pattern is constructed in such a way that no matter how large an area is covered, the pattern never repeats itself. The diamond pattern used in Oxford is an example of Penrose's third pattern, known as P3.









GATHER.

Gather is a project in Berryfield, Wiltshire commissioned by renowned artist Kerry Lemon. A range of different porcelains were used to create a permanent mural that wraps around the community centre.

Throughout the piece, Kerry has drawn visual stories, about the culture, landscapes, and history of the area that we have sandblasted into the mural, the local community are encouraged to take hand rubbings from to create their own artwork.













STORY POINT.

The Storypoints project shines a light on the importance of bringing communities together to celebrate the past, present and future of the City Hall in Cornwall, a building that is at the heart of the Truro community and still plays a crucial part of city life. The artists designs were cast in bronze and inlaid into porcelain discs and placed throughout the listed building to architecturally enhance this public space.
